## **Minutes:**

### I. Welcome

- Vicki Nellis thanked all the attendees to the quarterly Green Purchasing Committee meeting and reviewed the agenda items. She informed attendees that this meeting will be recorded.

### II. Presentation: *Supercharge Green Purchasing through Refrigerants*, Aleisha Khan and Tristam Coffin, Efecterra

- Aleisha started the presentation introducing REEF (Refrigerant Emissions Elimination Forum) and their mission to reduce GHG emissions targeting refrigerants to make them higher performing and environmentally preferred. She explains the demand for refrigerants is increasing, while refrigerants are the top growing contributor to GHG emissions. REEF envisions a world where there is zero climate impact from cooling and heating pump technologies.

  - *Vicki remarked that the SPLC document Aleisha referenced in the presentation contains the same requirements as the updated HVAC GPC specification.*
- Tristam gave a presentation about Efecterra, a public benefit corporation that helps many entities around the country to provide consulting services to drive positive change in climate impact. They are designed to bring all stakeholders together to help with their GHG footprint in reducing and tracking emissions. Efecterra targeted refrigerants as well, to find better solutions for many organizations that are looking to reduce their environmental impact.

  - *Question: Are refrigerants used for data centers being considered? Tristam explained that the overwhelming focus on refrigerants is on uses for power, and less focused on data centers.*
  - *Question: If you could choose one cost saving measure for refrigerants, what would be your first initial step? Answer: Build the inventory and have an understanding of what you are going to need to procure.*

### III. GPC Business & Activities Update - provided by Vicki Nellis.

- Approval of Meeting Minutes
  - The GPC meeting minutes for November were motioned to approve by Dionne Washington with the Department of Health. Acacia Laing with the Department of Natural Resources seconded the motion, and the meeting minutes were approved.
- GPC Activities Update
  - Poplar Island on August 19th - The tour taught the history of the island and the multiple strategies and types of work done to preserve the island
  - Maryland NEW Green Purchasing Specialists- The certification course (GPS) was taught in September. A total of 23 specialists across 14 agencies became certified! The graduation ceremony is tentatively scheduled for April.

- State Archives Tour on November 3rd - The GPC learned about the history of the State Archives agency and the great work they do on a daily basis.

#### IV. Specifications - provided by Vicki Nellis

- HVAC (update)
  - Including legislation with the most up to date language.
  - Refrigerant prohibitions.
  - Minimum requirements about Boilers to align with MD Zero-Emission Heating Equipment Standard.
  - Expanding refrigerant collection to all refrigerants.
  - Removing 2018 IECC tables and adding 2024 IECC tables.

*Dionne Washington motioned to approve the specification. Acacia Laing seconded the motion, and specification was approved. The specification will be posted to the GPC website on the specifications [page](#).*

#### V. Reporting Update

- Agency Reporting Update
  - In FY2025, a total of 43 agencies complied with reporting requirements, and 27 of those reports contained green products.
  - The total green spend from agencies for FY2025 is ~\$13.2 million. Electronics and IT was the primary green spend category, contributing to 76% of the green spend.

- Vendors Reporting Update

- In FY2025, 20 total vendors reported their commodities sold on statewide contracts.
- In those reports, a total of ~\$44.5 million in green spend was recorded, and a % green spend of ~47%.
- Electronics & IT, office supplies, and janitorial supplies were the highest green spend categories, each over \$4 million.

- FY2025 Reporting Achievements

- Compared to last year's data, compliance improved from 24 responsive agencies to 43.
- The number of agencies that reported green products grew from 16 to 27.
- The reports had been completed more accurately and required less follow-up action compared to last year's results.
- A number of agencies submitted green purchasing reports for the first time since FY2022.
